


How do we research?

Our research primarily relies on the study of church records. In the German-speaking area, church records were introduced in the 15th century and established nationwide in the 16th century. Although some were lost over the centuries (many during the Thirty Years' War), they are a marvelously comprehensive source for genealogical research. But what are church records precisely? The church recorded every birth, baptism, marriage, death, and burial, documenting the existence of every individual regardless of status, gender, or wealth. Until 1876, religious communities only recorded civil statuses. Based on these sources, it is possible to trace family roots back over centuries!

Recently, German churches began digitizing and uploading their records across the country. Thus, it is possible to conduct genealogy research online without visiting an archive. This way, we can offer you research on your ancestors for the entire German-speaking area, regardless of where they lived.

We start our research with any person you would like us to start our research with, whom we designate as No. 1 in the family tree. To navigate through the increasing number of ancestors, we use the Sosa method, a scientific approach that assigns to each ancestor a specific number, indicating their position in the family tree. This method helps us organize the vast amount of data and ancestors we encounter. As we move up each generation, the number of ancestors doubles. The info box below explains further how the Sosa method works:



Info: Pedigree Chart – The Sosa Method

- The number of a person's father is twice their own number. The number of a person's mother is twice their own number plus one.

- The number of a father's son is half of their own. The number of a mother's daughter is half of their own minus one.

- Except for number one, male persons always have an even and female an uneven number.

Additional information (Weitere Informationen):

Uncommon in these times, Johann Heinrich Joseph Sundorf took his wife's name: Maria Catharina Fehmer. Accordingly, their four children had the family name Fehmer. Also unusual, Johann Heinrich Jopseh Sundorf kept the name after his wife's early death. His second wife, Anna Maria Christina Alfers, and their four children also received the family name "Fehmer" and not Sundorf or Alfers, which is the normal procedure. We do not know why the spouses took the name Fehmer. One possibility could be that Maria Catharina Fehmer's family had a farm, and the farm and the family that runs it should keep the traditional name.

Kötter: A "Kötter" (also spelled "Kötter" or "Köter") is a historical term used in German-speaking regions, particularly in rural areas of northern and central Germany, to describe a small farmer or cottager. Kötter typically owned a modest amount of land, often just enough for subsistence farming. Unlike larger landowners or full-time farmers, Kötter did not usually possess extensive agricultural holdings. They typically supplemented their income through additional work, such as day labor or artisanal crafts. The term is rooted in the feudal and agrarian societies of medieval and early modern Germany, where land ownership and social status were closely intertwined. Regions where the term was commonly used include Westphalia, Lower Saxony, and parts of Schleswig-Holstein.

The **family name "Sundorf"** is of German origin, combining "Sund," which could refer to a strait or a narrow body of water, and "dorf," meaning village. This name can be interpreted as "Village by the Strait" or "Sun Village," suggesting a settlement near a body of water or a place characterized by its sunny location. Though relatively rare, the surname is most commonly found in North Rhine-Westphalia. The combination of elements in "Sundorf" reflects typical naming conventions in German-speaking regions, where geographical features often influenced place and family names.
